I am going to reissue a logic problem that no one sent in a solution to the other day. The idea behind this type of logic puzzle is to set up a matrix or grid where you cross reference data. I use the dots to mark a square when I know something is true and the letter x to mark a grid I know to be not true. Once you know something is true in a section then you can mark the rest of the column and row with X's. For instant, from Clue 6 below we know that Jake's last name is Bremmer and that he bought shirts.
